7-20-16 President's Report

1. Ex-Director Chase Norton and HTMC Materials

I believe that all the missing materials (the computer and scanner, as well as the hard copy documents) have now been returned to the clubhouse (I picked them up from Chase's place of work but did not meet Chase in person). However, there is still (at least) one outstanding issue: ownership of the gmail (and therefore google docs) account, which was set up and is still currently under Chase's name. Chase has been asked several times to transfer ownership (to website committee chair Nate Luzod), but this has not happened yet. If Chase does not change ownership within the next week, I believe the Board should instruct Mae Luzod to open a new account (with a slightly different, and more correct name, hawaiiantrailandmountainclub or htmclub rather than the current hawaiiantrailmountainclub@gmail) and transfer all the pertinent HTMC files.

2. First Aid / First Responder Courses

HTMC member Svenja Harms has agreed to organize and co-conduct a session early in the New Year.

3. Request to form partner association with Portland-based Mazama climbing and hiking group. Jay Feldman has submitted a proposal for the Board's consideration at the August meeting. However, although I am generally worried by the potential pressure on our resources of such partnerships (we are much smaller both in terms of active members and clubhouse facilities--and the HTMC clubhouse is obviously primarily for the use of our own members), I am much more concerned with how these partnerships are being proposed, established, and, particularly, administered. I know I was not the only member to be shocked by the announcement (on social media) that the upcoming New Zealand exchange trip is (potentially) open to non-members ("Join our sister club in New Zealand for a two-week hiking safari 1/25/17 - 2/7/17. Open to HTMC members and nonmembers," with "the decision to allow non-members," according to Larry Lee in an email response, "ATC's"). It is my opinion that the Board should be playing a greater role in ATC and any potential future club-to-club exchanges, possibly by officially appointing the HTMC member to lead particular trips under such exchanges and, definitely, by determining with the Board of the sister club the parameters for such trips. Similarly, any proposal from Mazama in Portland ("a non-profit Mountaineering Education organization") should come from their Board or the equivalent of their president rather than a member of HTMC who happens to be currently living in Oregon. I am not opposed to partnerships as long as 1. clearly defined and appropriate channels of communication are established first, and 2. the partnership offers clear member benefits for HTMC members. Individual members may suggest potential partnerships, but the Board must not only approve them but also, in my opinion, administer them.

Schedule Committee Report for BOD Meeting, 8/17/16

At the July 27 meeting, the committee selected proposed hike dates, trail maintenance dates, and coordinators for the 4th quarter. The question of electronic distribution of the schedule was postponed until more members were present (Stuart Ball, Joyce Oka, Grant Oka & Jim Yuen were absent). Of note is the new Pauoa Uka hike proposed by John Hall, which has been well-received by the Sole Mates. Also, Ken Suzuki will be leading a Kahuku shoreline plant identification hike. Ron Miller suggests putting "A \$3 donation is requested from all non-members" on the website for all public hikes. Some some of the guests on his Likeke hike were unaware of this, and were unprepared.

At the August 10 meeting, the committee reviewed the first draft of the hike write-ups. Barb had emailed her edits. JUN 18 SAT 8:30 AM NUUANU, COORDINATOR WIL KAWANO

We had 23 hikers, 8 members and 15 guests, far more than the six we had last year. The weather was good. There were no incidents. Thanks to Justin Ohara and Darrell Teruya who helped check the trail and cleared a large fallen tree that was blocking the trail. Justin also provided much help on the hike.

JUN 19 SUN 8:30 AM (MEMBERS) PUU O KONA, COORDINATOR GRANT OKA

MEMBERS - 18

Grant's report -

Turnaround time: N/A loop hike

Incidents: none.

Weather: An overcast day with clouds and mist and breezy winds on the summit. Threat of rain

but no rain.

Condition of the Trail: East ridge well cleared as well as summit crossing to the state trail. Trail Maintenance crew did a great job. From state trail to Puu O Kona very overgrown but passable. Down the west ridge was cleared well by the crew. Condition of ropes was adequate but would probably not really hold any weight.

The Hike: Counter Clockwise route up to the fire break road. Then into the valley and up the east ridge (Mauna O Ahi). Most took the state trail down as the weather was misty wet and cold so the crossover condition was muddy with low visibility. Periods of clear views to the north opened occasionally. Most were well before 1400. Myself and the last 3 hikers were out by 1500.

Recommendation: This hike should remain on the schedule as "members only" due to the significant life threatening risk of falling off the trail on the summit crossover. The write up should change the meeting place from the community park to the trailhead. The write up should also caution that parking should be on Kuliouou Drive and hikers should walk up Kaalau St to the trailhead.

JUN 26 SUN 8:30 AM EHUKAI KAUNALA, COORDINATOR FRED BOLL

Ron's report -

The hike went very well with no incidents to report. The weather was sunny with steady breezes. There were many mountain apples ready to pick along the trail. The trail was much drier then when I tried it last Monday.

52 attended the hike. There were 29 guest and 23 members which was a bit of a surprise. Those numbers caused a parking issue at the Ho'omaluhia park entrance. The guard let us into the park before 9:00 which caused some confusing for the late comers. It all got corrected and we were off by 9:20. Again I would suggest that the web site post that there is a \$3 voluntary contribution for guests

JUL 3 SUN 8:30 AM (MEMBERS) KOLOA GULCH, COORDINATOR DOUG KLEIN MEMBERS - 17

Dusty: "No problems. 13 got all the way to the falls & last one was about about 3pm."

JUL 10 SUN 8 AM TRIPLER RIDGE, COORDINATOR MIKE ALGIERS MEMBERS - 26, GUESTS - 5, KIDS - 0

Mike's report -

We met for this hike at 8:00 AM in the small community park in Moanalua Valley, at the end of Ala Aolani street. Since it was an "Open" hike, we had a mix of members (26), and non-members (5), and there may have been a few hikers who did not sign in. A total of \$17 in donations was collected (one hiker gave \$5 and said keep the change). When the hikers were signing the waiver, I asked if any of them planned to go over to the Haiku Stairs, and I explained that that was not permitted on this hike, and if they had intended to do that, they should scratch their names from the list and sign themselves out of the Club hike. Nobody said they intended to do that. However, a few hikers did not sign in, and evidently had another plan (which they did not share with me). That plan was to hike to the top of Tripler, and then cross over to Bowman, and come down Bowman. They were evidently successful, because when I got out at 4pm, one of them was just driving away, and cheerfully waved to me.

After I gave the briefing, the Club hike got underway at about 8:15 am. The route I had selected was to hike to the very end of the valley on the carriage road, and go up the "End of the Road" trail, proceed to the summit, and then come all the way back down Tripler Ridge, and descent "Marker 12" to the valley floor. I was sweeping, and arrived at the end of the road at 10:00am, and encountered a new sign which read "End of Trail...,Do Not Proceed Beyond Please". Everyone seemed to have proceeded, so I followed, in order to continue sweeping. I then climbed to the junction with the Tripler ridge (arrived at 10:45). The plan was for everyone to turn left and proceed to the summit, and then have their lunch there...but some folks decided to skip the summit, and they turned right, going down the Tripler ridge toward "marker 12", where they could descend the ridge trail to the road. The hikers who went to the summit eventually took the same route back.

We encountered quite a number of independent hikers on the trail throughout the day, including several who had come from Tripler Hospital, so I guess that part of the trail is still open and passable. (one small group of 5 young people was headed up the middle ridge, and probably toward the Haiku stairs).

As the sweep, I continued toward the summit, and encountered a number of the fast hikers already coming back down from there. The weather had been mild with light wind and sporadic cloud cover, so the view from the summit was come and go. By the time I reached the summit (12:10) it was socked in, and I didn't get a view. I was the last one up there. I had a quick lunch, and started back down, catching up with the tail end of the group. We followed Tripler ridge down to the "marker 12" turn, and followed that ridge down to the valley floor (bottom at 3:30), and followed the road back to the park (4:12). Along the road, the State is doing some maintenance, which consists of using a big mechanical arm on a tractor to shred the vegetation on either side, and it is quite messy and unsightly.

When we got back to the Park, all of the other hikers had already left, so I checked license numbers of the remaining vehicles, and was satisfied that all of our hikers were accounted for. There were no incidents or problems reported. It was a good hike.

JUL 16 SAT 8 AM LUAALAEA, COORDINATOR RICH BAILEY MEMBERS - 13, GUESTS - 9, KIDS - 0

Rich's report -

Headed in about 8:10 am. Lots of rain as we crossed the first stream. I lead group while Elaine swept. Water was flowing rapidly and heavily. No way to cross without getting wet boots. Trail was heavily overgrown, even more so than when last we scouted it a few weeks back. Some muddy spots and a few more blowdowns as well. As we headed up Lua'alaea valley I had hard time finding trail several times because of amount of flowing water, foliage and blowdowns. Two times had to backtrack to find right

path. Meanwhile rain continued to come and go and we were all soaked. Still everyone seemed to be having a good time. After scrambling up past past flood debris we finally made to the falls around 9:15am. It was flowing magnificently. Many people took tons of photos and videos. Justin Ohara had arrived late and he offered to sweep out for me. Rained heavily for a while as we left the falls and trail back was totally flooded. On the way out, as Elaine and I neared the cutover to the Manoa trail, we ran across a group that had left the falls earlier but had gone down the wrong path. I showed them the correct way out and led them back to the Manoa Falls trail. I waited until Justin came out with the last hiker. The time was around 11:00am by the time Elaine and I checked license plates.

Recommend even though it's a Saturday hike, it be scheduled for trail maintenance before hiking it again next time.

JUL 17 SUN 8:30 AM (MEMBERS) PUU MANAMANA, COORDINATOR UDOM STAMEGNA MEMBERS - 15

Udom's report -

Since it was predicted to rain all day Sunday (and it did), I gave the hikers an options to come down via Kahekili trail. Only Clayton and another lady said they are coming down Cemetery Ridge, all other hikers came down via Kahekili trail. I stayed with Alan (he's 76 years old) we finished just after 4 pm, checked all park cars at the Swanzy Beach Park and at the trail head. All our hikers are out.

Here's my thoughts, when we cleared the trail last Sunday, only 8 clearers made the complete loop. The trail from Kahekili to cemetery ridge was very overgrown and super muddy. Looks like not too many people use this side of the trail, and for today hike only two people wants to hike cemetery route. Lot of work for so little use. So maybe with the trail committee approval, can we take out the cemetery ridge portion and just hike Puu Manamana to Kahekili. Easy to maintain, more uses and safer for hikers.
